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
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About Me

Curtains get pulled


Green cards slid under door

Civilian Response




Be quiet, sit on the floor in the corner, and don't move...



Civilian Response... Debate Phase




A change begins...

First Blind Peer Reviewed Published Scientific study on Active Shooter Drills shows lockdown, at minimum, triples casualties when used over multi-option response in similar scenarios. (11)



Civilian Response...Today and the Future



Risk Assessment, Threat Assessment, Training, Recovery







- According to the National Child
 Traumatic Stress Network, one in four children has been exposed to trauma that may affect their behavior. As such, it's crucial that safety training utilizes a traumainformed approach to maintain a school environment that meets students' physical, emotional, and social safety needs.
- The Four R's
 - Realize
 - Recognize
 - Respond
 - Resist re-traumatization

Train, Drill, Exercise- Know the Difference Campus Safety



- **Training**
 - Lecture, Instructor Demonstrations, Walk-throughs
- **Drills**
 - Participant demonstrations of learned skills
- Exercise
 - Takes place at a location using equipment and personnel as if it was a real event. Takes months of planning to conduct safely.







- Always announce every drill.
 Students, parents, and staff should always have notice of an upcoming drill.
- Reduce the length and dramatization of simulations.
- Discuss the training with students afterward.

- Provide age-appropriate safety training.
- Utilize calming strategies with students who struggle during training or drills.
- Offer Alternative means of learning for students who are vulnerable to stressors.
